RELATED TO PAN AFRICAN ACHIEVEMENTS

(1) 1973-74: Entered Uni. of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) Ph.D program in African Studies. Got elected as new president of the African Activist Students Association/Associate Editor, UFAHAMU Journal of African Affairs.

(2) In Los Angeles, was appointed (by previous executive board) Chairman of the 6th Pan African Congress Organizing Committee of the West Coast. Contacted fellow Pan Africanists in Northern California, and helped elect the state co-chairman (Prof. Oba T'Shaka Simba). Together our job was to hold preparatory meetings in both parts of the state to identify delegates to the upcoming 6 PAC being planned for Dar-es-Sallam, Tanzania.

(3) Attended the 6 PAC in June, 1974, as West Coast representative and wrote a 1975 essay (not my best writing) in *The Journal of Black Scholars* assessing the gathering.

(4) 1977-1978 visited Dar-es-Salaam, Tanzania in association with the History Department of the school to do investigative field work for my dissertation. Lived and worked for 8 months in Zanzibar , Kilwa Kivinje, and Dar-es-Salaam. Traveled to Mozambique to meet with African activist students there.

(5) 1976, Co-organizer of the first cadre on the West Coast of the All African People's Revolutionary Party (AAPRP), originally organized in the U.S. by Stokely Carmichael (Kwame Toure) and Bob Brown.

(6) 1980-1985, Member in Los Angeles of the L.A. Pan African Writers' Association,

faculty member, Department of Black Studies, Uni. of California, Riverside.

Editor-in-chief, Journal of African Studies.

(7) 1986-87, As part of the Pan African Organizing Committee and AAPRP, was the faculty organizer of the Pan African trip to Jamaica for students and faculty, Compton College.

(8) 1990-2000, as head of the Pan African Organizing Committee, organized 3 conferences in Accra, Ghana, the Kwame Nkrumah Center, to build relationships with Ghanaian students and community organizers.

(9) (2003) Attended the conference in Barbados to organize the Pan African

(10) 2011 Attended the World Conference Against Racism in South Africa as a member of the Pan African Peoples' Organization out of the Caribbean.

(11) Helped to organize what became the Global African Congress (GAC), created at the end of a conference in Barbados, 2002. Was the original head of the North American branch, but had to dissolve it when the international leadership went rogue.

(12) 2006 Organized the Sixth Region Diaspora Caucus (SRDC) in Los Angeles and began trying to connect the African Diaspora with the African Union. In cooperation with the Europe Region Sixth Region Facilitators Working Group that started in the Netherlands.

(13) Traveled to Brazil, Ghana, and eventually to the Netherlands, France, Martinique, Guadeloupe, Germany, Canada, etc.) organizing for Diasporan entrance into the African Union. That work continues until today, non-stop as Leader of the SRDC (Sixth Region Diaspora Caucus) and with regards to the AUADS Sixth Region High Council as the result of the implementation by civil societies for decades.

(14) In 2014, as a delegate, attended the 8th Pan African Congress, held in Cape

Town, South Africa.

(15) In 2022 co-initiator of the Pan African Roots Synergy Event on the 10th anniversary of the African Union May 25th Diaspora Declaration.
